Collision Repair and Refinish

The Job Corps Collision Repair and Refinish career training program takes 8 to 12 months to complete and requires training in the following subject areas:

- **Nonstructural analysis and damage repair – body components**
 - Safety and preparation procedures
 - Outer body panel repairs, replacements, and adjustments
 - Metal finishing and body filling
 - Moveable glass and hardware
 - Metal welding and cutting
 - Plastics and adhesives
- **Mechanical and electrical components**
 - Safety procedures
 - Suspension and steering
 - Electrical
 - Brakes
 - Heating and air conditioning
 - Cooling systems
 - Drive train
 - Fuel, intake, and exhaust systems
 - Restraint systems

- **Painting and refinishing**
 - Safety procedures
 - Surface preparation
 - Spraygun and related equipment operation
 - Paint mixing, matching, and applying
 - Paint defects
 - Final detail

Credentials:

Students who complete a Job Corps training program are eligible to receive the following credential:

- ASE/NATEF Program Certification

Eligibility requirements:

Before completing a Collision Repair and Refinish training program, students should:

- Have the basic math and reading skills necessary to perform the job.
- Complete the core curriculum and pass all written and performance tests.

Average length of training:

8 to 12 months

The salary range for various careers in Collision Repair and Refinish is:

\$29,000 to \$49,000/year
